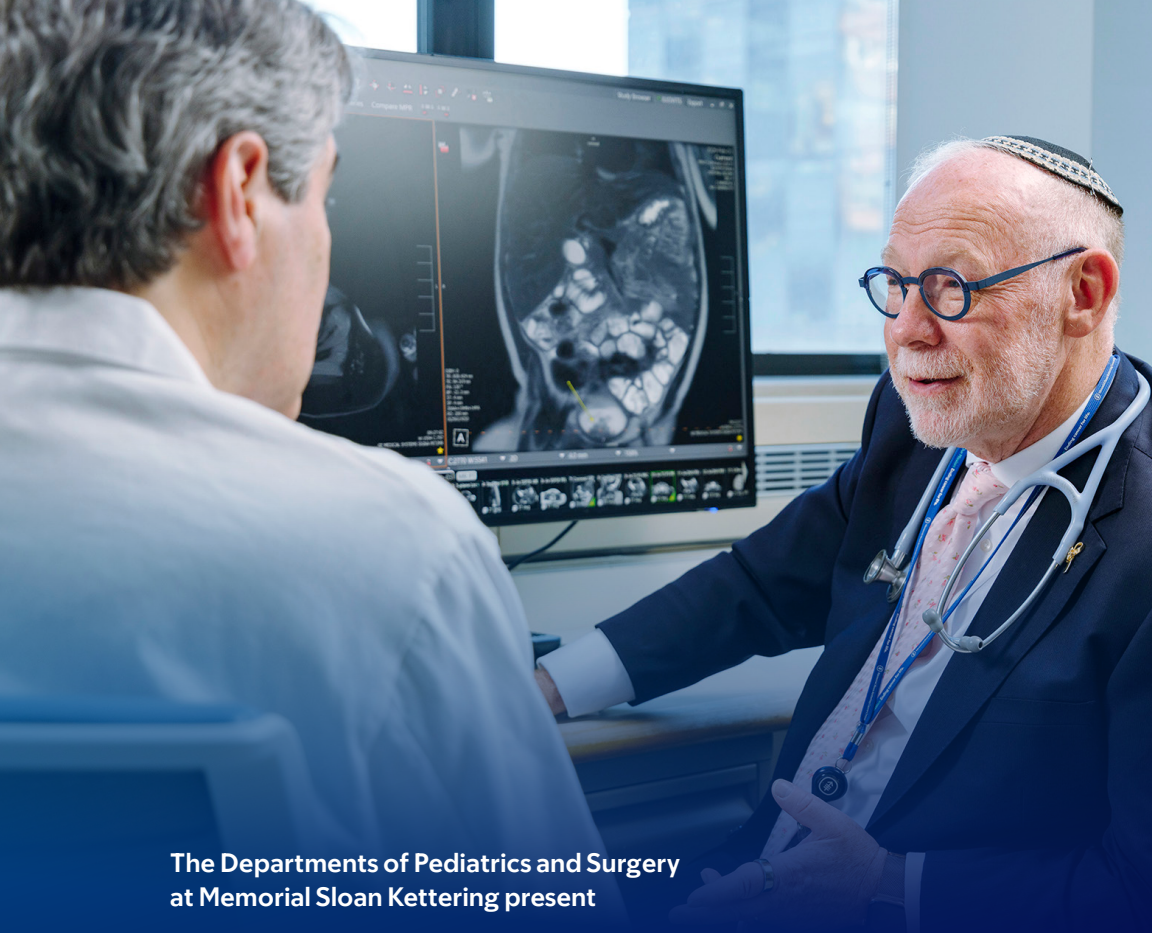

The management of rhabdomyosarcoma requires a highly coordinated, multidisciplinary approach. This comprehensive one-day symposium will equip healthcare professionals with the latest evidence, best practices, and practical strategies to improve clinical outcomes and the patient experience.

Overview

Jointly presented by the **Departments of Pediatrics and Surgery** at MSK, the program will highlight the importance of collaboration across specialties and disciplines throughout the continuum of care. Key topics include advances in medical management, surgical innovation, diagnostic imaging, and translational research. A dedicated session will explore the patient journey through the perspectives of patients and families, providing valuable insight into the lived experience of rhabdomyosarcoma care.

Participants will gain actionable strategies to strengthen evidence-based, collaborative care; enhance quality of life for patients and families; and gain a deeper understanding of the scientific advances moving the field closer to cure.

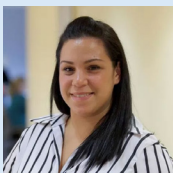

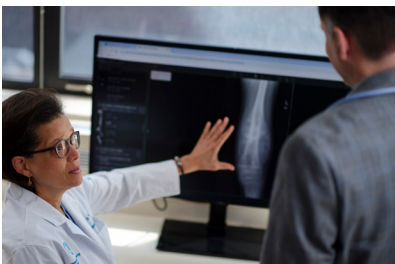

About the Annual Symposium

In 2023, Memorial Sloan Kettering became the first hospital in the nation to receive the **American College of Surgeons' Children's Surgery Verification (CSV) Quality Improvement Program Level I Specialty Children's Center in Oncology** designation. Developed in support of the CSV program standards, this annual symposium brings together experts to share advances, innovative approaches, and strategies in pediatric oncology surgery.



Each year, the program focuses on a different topic, including prior symposia on **Advancing Osteosarcoma Care: From Bench to Bedside (2025)** and the **2024 MSK Kids Surgery Symposium (2024)**.

The goal of the symposium is to share knowledge and strategies that support healthcare professionals in delivering state-of-the-art, collaborative care that improves outcomes and enhances quality of life for pediatric oncology patients.
